## **License Conversion**

In NC, the first license teachers receive is a Standard Professional 1 (SP 1) license. At the end of the 3rd year, teachers are eligible for a Standard Professional 2 (SP 2) license IF they have successfully completed a three year Beginning Teacher induction program and met all the components required of that program. Beginning teachers should communicate with their Beginning Teacher Coordinator, the district's Licensure Specialist, and their Mentor for information about the licensing process in NC.

FYI: In August, 2015, the Licensure Dept. at DPI moved to an electronic licensing process.
