







School Highlights



Pre-K students were so proud of the process art project they completed during #ArtsInEducationWeek! They used their fine motor skills to color the first letter of their names, which also reinforced letter recognition. Then, they glued items — including arms and legs — onto their letter. They wrapped up the activity by going on a letter hunt for more of their beginning letter, and glued those on, too! They were also engrossed in sculpting, painting and building.



At BRES, Mr. Johnson's class used bubbles and paint to create bubble prints. And 6th graders became archeologists, exploring ancient cave art and learning about how Stone Age people lived! First graders, along with the school's new kindergarten students, worked on a "creativity" sign for the art room. Meanwhile, 6th graders painted a barn quilt that will be auctioned off during the upcoming fall festival event.

K classes also explored their five senses with popcorn. They had a blast listening to, tasting, smelling, touching and watching it pop!


