

Site Coordinator Update:

Site coordinators work in the schools to provide the coordination and delivery of student based services at their designated school site. This includes providing weekly or twice monthly check-ins to see how the students on their caseload are progressing on their goals. Some students have mentors to help them progress on their various goals. Ms. Roark finished this semester with 35 students on her caseload at ACMS that she meets with on a regular basis. Student referrals can come from family members, school staff, and others.

At Ashe County Middle School, the site coordinator also helps with the Shoes for Kids program, school supplies, and more. She works with local partners to ensure that students are surrounded with a community of support, empowering them to achieve in school and life.


Local Churches and Organizations Partner to Support Snack Attack & New Bulldog Bites Food Pantry



Snack Attack got its start because of the needs assessment completed each year by Communities In Schools of Northwest North Carolina. Food insecurity for students had been identified as a need by staff so the idea for Snack Attack was born. Thankfully, local churches and organizations have pitched in and provided snacks for over 470 students each time Snack Attack is held.

Snack Attack started in March, which means that over 5,000 snacks have been given out at Ashe County Middle School. Students often ask when the next Snack Attack is with the most requested items being fruit bites and Captains Wafer crackers with cream cheese and chives. Other items include granola bars and any kind of Lance or Austin snack crackers of any variety.

Who is Communities In Schools of NWNC?

Communities In Schools is the nation's largest, most effective organization dedicated to keeping kids in school and helping them succeed in life. Communities In Schools of Northwest North Carolina has a site coordinator at Ashe County Middle School who works day to day helping bring community resources to meet needs of students and the school.

CISNWNC serves Ashe, Alexander, Alleghany, and Wilkes Counties. Currently in Ashe County, Ashe County Middle School has the only site coordinator; however, there are plans for expansion to our other schools. Last year, CISNWNC served over 15,000 students in our service area.

At Communities In Schools, we work hand-in-hand with schools, communities and families to surround our students with a caring network of support to help them stay in school and succeed in life. Working in more than 2,300 K-12 schools and community-based sites in the most challenged communities in 25 states and the District of Columbia, we have 3,800 trained professionals and 38,000 volunteers who help 1.5 million young people and their families every year.

What is a site coordinator?

Communities In Schools trains and places highly qualified site coordinators and supporting staff directly into schools. Once there, our job is to connect students and their families to basic and critical community resources tailored to each student's specific needs. By providing students with a one-on-one relationship with a caring adult, we create a safe place to learn and grow. We work to provide a strong start to a healthy future, a path toward marketable skills upon graduation, and a chance to give back to peers and the community.

<u>School Supplies</u>: The school supplies drive will be held again this summer at many locations in the county including Wal-Mart, Ashe Memorial Hospital, Ashe County Library, and most of our local banks. Most requested items include mechanical pencils, composition notebooks, ear buds (for digital learning in the classroom), and boxes of tissues.

CISNWNC Hosts Holocaust Speakers for ACMS Students

Ashe County Middle School was happy to have Dr. Zohara Boyd and Dr. Peter Petschauer returned to speak to our 7th graders again in May along with another guest, Dr. Chris Patti, from Appalachian State University. Dr. Boyd

and Dr. Petschauer were both children in Europe during World War II, and their experiences were worlds apart. Now, their friendship gives an inspiring example for all of us and their stories greatly impacted our 7th grade students at ACMS.

Dr. Boyd grew up in Poland during the Nazi occupation. By obtaining the baptismal certificates and other documents of a Polish Catholic family, her Jewish parents were able to escape death in the horrors of the Holocaust. Ultimately, they were able to hide in plain sight. Petschauer's family lived on the other side. Born and raised in Germany, his father was an officer of the dreaded SS. As a child, he was raised under the rules of Nazi Germany, and it was



not until later in life that he learned to come to grips with his family's past. Petschauer and Boyd met as academic colleagues at Appalachian State University, but now use their friendship to share their experiences of one of history's most devastating storms, telling their stories of hope and experience.

Many of the thank-you letters the students wrote afterwards addressed how the speakers helped students be more thankful and they learned how to be more forgiving. Others wrote that they would never forget Dr. Boyd and Dr. Petschauer sharing with them. The entire 7th grade traveled to Blue Ridge Elementary Auditorium to see the presentation and some ACMS students even went on stage to ask questions.

Teacher Appreciation Week Giveaways

Teachers were celebrated during Teacher Appreciation Week that was held nationally during the week of May 5—May 11. Communities In Schools of Northwest North Carolina received the donation of a Staples brand new tall chair to be given away during the special
